

## **HOW A GIFT IN YOUR** WILL CAN HELP

When you leave a gift in your Will, you can choose which area of Nottingham's NHS hospitals you wish to support. Gifts left in our supporters' Wills have helped us fund a whole host of important roles and projects at Hayward House palliative care centre - including Patient and Family Support Coordinator Julie Smith, whose role is funded by donations to Nottingham Hospitals Charity.



We spoke to Julie about how her role impacts patients and their loved ones at Hayward House.

- Q. Hi Julie, it's great to speak to you. Firstly, can you tell us a bit about your role at Hayward House?
- A. I think the most important thing within my role is building relationships with patients, and being able to gain their confidence and trust that whatever they may need while in our care. I will be able to support them with. With my role being non-clinical, supporting patients who are terminally ill or at the end of their life, there can be a huge amount of things they may need support with. That might be helping patients and families plan funerals, dealing with solicitors for various reasons, paying bills and so on, and sometimes I might help plan family celebrations on the unit, such as birthdays or weddings.

#### Q. And how do you help families, alongside patients, at Hayward House?

A. Having a loved one receiving end of life care can of course be a very stressful time. As well as supporting patients, I also support their families in whatever ways they need. Sometimes I might help reconnect patients with family members they haven't seen for years. I also support children who are visiting family members at Hayward House, as it can be a daunting place for them, and

I'm there to support families through the grief process when they lose their loved one.

#### Q. What do you find most rewarding about your role?

A. My role is all about helping to bring love, trust, care and warmth to patients in their final days. Hayward House is proud to provide holistic care for patients and their loved ones - while all their medical needs are taken care of by the doctors and nurses, I'm here to help provide all the non-medical care and compassion they need. It's so special to be able to take the time to sit with patients during their final days, and offer them support, and just be there to listen to them. And, in turn, it's rewarding to see families choosing to fundraise and donate to the unit, in thanks for the care they and their loved ones have received.

#### YOUR HEALTH AND WELLBEING

Now that the winter months are upon us, it's important to do all you can to keep yourself and your loved ones warm and healthy. The NHS has the following advice for protecting yourself and others this winter:

- Keep warm ideally heat your home to at least 18C, wear several light layers of clothes, and remember to stay active even while indoors. Try not to sit for more than an hour without getting up and moving around.
- Avoid catching colds always wash your hands with soap and water to help protect yourself and others from winter colds
- Check your medicine cabinet it can be helpful to make sure you've got a supply of over-the-counter medicines in stock, such as paracetamol and

- ibuprofen, in case you become unwell and don't want to leave the house
- Stay up-to-date with your vaccines remember to make an appointment for your flu and COVID-19 vaccines if you're eligible, to help protect yourself and others
- Look out for others keep in touch with friends, family and vulnerable neighbours, and offer to help with fetching food and medicine supplies if they are unwell and you are able to help



# BOWLS OVER HEARTS AS NEW AMBASSADOR FOR THE BIG APPEAL

England cricket legend Stuart Broad and mum Carole have joined us as official ambassadors for the Big Appeal, which aims to raise £1.5million over the next three years for Nottingham Children's Hospital.

The Big Appeal aims to raise funds for key areas of Nottingham Children's Hospital, including the new Neonatal Unit currently being built at the QMC – which is a cause extremely close to Stuart's and his mum Carole's hearts.

Stuart said: "The Big Appeal is really important to me. I was born at 31-and-a-half weeks, weighing 2.2 pounds. My dad said that when he held his hand out, my whole body fitted inside his hand. I was kept alive by the Neonatal Unit in Nottingham, so I obviously owe a huge amount – I owe my life to them.

"I'm here now, at six foot six, 38 years old today, and I've been able to achieve a huge amount of goals. Without the care I received in the first ten weeks of my life, that certainly wouldn't have been possible."

The hospital's Neonatal staff already provide the best possible medical care, and the NHS will fund the essentials of the new unit. But fundraising through the Big Appeal, which is run by Nottingham Hospitals Charity, will help to provide the added extras that can help bring comfort and stability to families at a time when their world has been turned upside down.

Stuart said: "My mum said the hardest thing she ever had to do was drive away from the hospital, without her newborn. As a parent myself now, I just couldn't imagine driving away from the hospital without my daughter Annabella with us.

"The scale of this new unit, the plans and the technology, is all incredible. Obviously, the baby is the number one priority, but also the care for the baby's family has been taken into account. The most stressful thing you can possibly go through is having your newborn be ill, and need intensive care. So to have a new building, where the mindset of the parents is taken care of as well, is unbelievable."

Mum Carole added: "There's no doubt

that, without the care and support we had all those years ago, Stuart wouldn't be here today.

"Walking through the door and seeing the new unit, I just felt that if my child needed care, this is where I'd want to be. The Big Appeal should really be called the Huge Appeal – because that's the difference it will make to everybody who comes through that door".

#### HAYWARD HOUSE GARDEN OFFICIALLY REOPENS

Thanks to our supporters, the revamped garden at Hayward House palliative care unit was officially opened in September.

Thanks to money generously donated by the local community, work has been completed on the garden, to make it more accessible for patients and visitors – allowing them time and space away from the hospital environment at what can be an extremely difficult time.

The funding has helped create new pathways so that patients in wheelchairs and beds can now access this peaceful area. Money raised through the Hayward House Appeal will also fund ongoing services and support for patients, such as additional nursing posts, counselling, emotional support and complementary therapy, as well as a new front entrance to make the unit more welcoming for patients and visitors.

The garden was officially reopened by the Lord Mayor of Nottingham, Councillor

Carole McCulloch, who was joined by other supporters and staff from Hayward House.

Sarah Radcliffe, Head of Service for Palliative Care and Lead Nurse for Palliative and End of Life at Nottingham Hospitals, said: "We're really pleased that the garden is now accessible to all patients and visitors, including those with mobility issues, and know this will have a positive impact on many of our patients. Thank you to everyone who has donated to the Hayward House Appeal, to make this possible.

"We're now looking forward to the next stage of the unit's redevelopment, with a new entrance being created, to provide a better experience for patients and families coming to the unit."

# Buzzy bees to help young patients

Thanks to your support, we've provided special devices to help children undergoing blood tests and injections. The 'buzzy bees' are small vibrating devices in the shape of a bee, with ice pack wings.

When placed on the skin, the buzzy bees provide natural pain relief by dulling sharp pain during injections and blood sampling for young patients with juvenile arthritis, who often have to undergo regular procedures. This small but impactful project helps to alleviate young patients' physical pain and anxiety.



# Clinic room to help patients get home sooner

We recently funded a special clinic room for Harvey 2 ward at City Hospital, which cares for patients who have undergone breast surgery or reconstruction.

The new room allows patients to be seen as outpatients during their recovery, rather than being admitted to the ward for an overnight stay – meaning they can get back to the comfort of their own home sooner.
